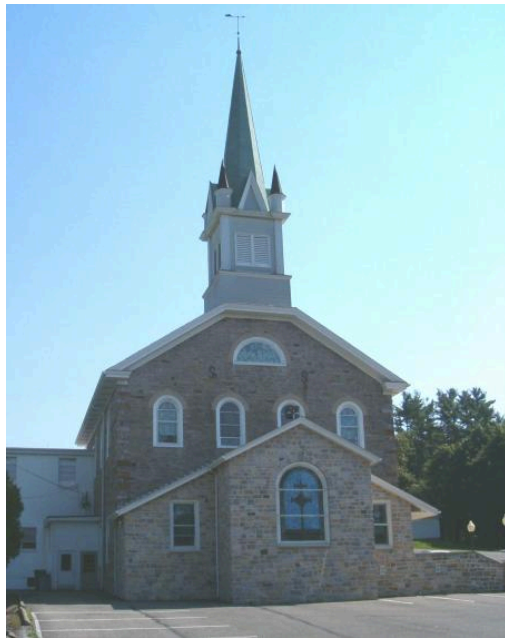

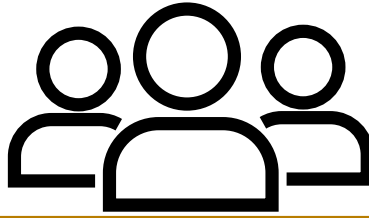

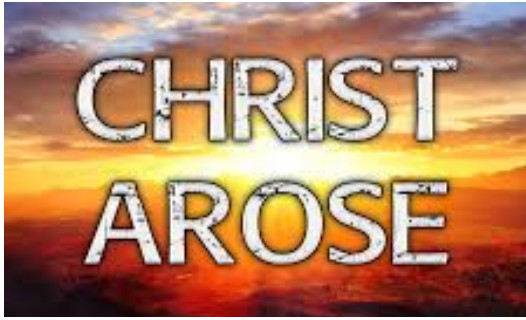

The History Behind the Hymn: Christ Arose

He is risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia! Happy Easter, church, and welcome to this new series “The History Behind The Hymn”. Today, let’s look at “Christ Arose”, written by Robert Lowry in 1874. Robert Lowry was born in Philadelphia in 1826. Growing up, he was on his church choir and helped teach Sunday school. His foundation was rooted in Jesus, and he later went on to become a preacher. He worked incredibly hard on his sermons, and was recognized for his ability to paint a picture in the imaginations of his congregants & excite an audience with his vivid descriptions. Although very consumed by his sermon writing, he always found time for another passion of his: music. Lowry always had a love for music, but songwriting ranked far below writing and delivering a sermon. So in 1874, on a spring day near Easter Sunday, Lowry was reading the account of Jesus’ death and resurrection. He had read this passage hundreds of times, yet this time, he felt that his eyes had been opened to the significance of the event. And thus, in a very spontaneous fashion, one of Easter’s greatest hymns was born... “Christ Arose”. With little effort during a nightly devotion, Lowry had written a hymn that has stood the test of time.

Sometimes it’s easy to believe that our purpose will only be revealed after endless soul searching. Or that we can only bring glory to God by working tirelessly and leaving our tanks on E. Sometimes, we’re even called to lead others in worship, but we say “no” because we feel we’re just not qualified to do it (oh wait, that was me nine years ago...) The truth is, God doesn’t need us prepared. He doesn’t need our ducks in a row. In fact, your ducks can be in the next pond over. As long as you’re willing, God can use you to bring glory to His name and share the Word with others, just like he did through Robert Lowry on that spring day in 1874.

If you don’t feel equipped for what God is calling you to do, that’s okay. You don’t have to be. You just need to say “yes”.

"Encourage, Not Discourage!"

Dear Keystone Members and Friends –

I grew up in a family that loved parades. I've been fortunate to have seen in person two of the most popular holiday parades. I've been to the Rose Parade on New Year's Day in Pasadena, CA, and got to witness the incredible artistry of those floats to which seeing them on TV can't compare. I also got to see the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in NYC, but from an unusual vantage point. When we couldn't find a spot on the street, my brother took us to a conference room in his company's office building, and we watched the parade through the 25th floor windows! We were actually looking down upon the famous balloons of that parade.

By now, most everyone is familiar with the scholarship on the two parades of Jerusalem on what we call Palm Sunday. Many believe that the peasant parade of Jesus, the disciples, and others was planned mockery and a counter-parade to the parade of power of Pontius Pilate and his Roman guards. The Romans were entering the city on the west side, Jesus and company on the east side.

This coming weekend in our country there will be two days of parades, if you will. The "No Kings" gatherings and marches will happen on Saturday and in many churches the Palm Sunday parade(s) will be remembered and in some even reenacted.

The parades this coming weekend can be compared to the tension of that first Palm Sunday in Jerusalem: Parades can be statements of power and/or protest. Sometimes, we need a 25th floor view to see the true scope and effectiveness of such gatherings. Jesus mocking Roman power in the occupied holy city of his faith made a statement that his power was not of this world. Pilate's Parade, and many ruling-party parades since, filled with swords, weapons and shows of loyalty are statements of authority of this world.

Nearly 2000 years later, we may still love a parade, especially those with artistry, passion, or the power of community at their hearts. Other parades hit differently.

So, it makes me wonder in a decade or two how the two parade days of this coming weekend will be viewed in terms of their power? I suppose the participants and viewers will decide the answer to that question in time.

Listening, Healing, and Engaging Through Podcast Ministry



Mission Support makes it possible for the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod to support creative ministries that reach people in new ways and respond to real needs in our communities. One recent example is a podcast project developed by Pastor Kim Truebenbach called *Condemned Happy*, supported through a Witness & Service Grant.

The project began with conversations between Pastor Kim and young adults who were wrestling with difficult experiences related to faith and religious communities. Many of these individuals carried deep questions or painful memories connected to their spiritual upbringing. Recognizing a need for compassionate listening and honest conversation, Pastor Kim began exploring how a podcast could create space for people to share their stories and reflect on faith, healing, and hope.

Through recorded conversations and storytelling, the podcast offered listeners a place where experiences could be shared without judgment. Rather than providing quick answers or trying to “fix” complex situations, the project focused on something deeply pastoral: listening. In doing so, it embodied the synod’s commitment to love, heal, and engage like Jesus, offering a reminder that sometimes the most faithful response we can offer one another is presence, understanding, and compassion.

The project also reflects several of the synod’s ministry lanes. By engaging conversations that resonate with younger generations who often encounter faith discussions online, the podcast reflects the synod’s commitment to Growing Young, meeting people where they are and listening to the questions and experiences shaping their lives today. Using accessible digital tools and online platforms, the ministry also demonstrates Gaining Strength, experimenting with new forms of communication that allow the church to connect with people beyond traditional settings.

At the same time, the project reflects the spirit of Going Beyond Death to Life, walking alongside individuals who have experienced spiritual hurt or who feel disconnected from church communities. By creating space for reflection and conversation, the podcast invites listeners to rediscover hope, trust, and the possibility of healing in their relationship with faith.


Technology made it possible for the conversations to reach a wide audience. Episodes were recorded through simple online tools and shared across podcast platforms and YouTube, places where many younger adults already spend time learning and engaging with ideas. According to podcast analytics, the episodes were downloaded more than 260 times, with listeners across the United States and internationally, demonstrating how digital ministry can connect people in unexpected ways.

While the podcast created an online space for conversation, its impact was also personal and relational. Pastor Kim noted that several young adults in her extended family began reaching out more frequently for conversation and support, knowing they would be met with openness and compassion. These relationships became opportunities for deeper listening and pastoral care, strengthening trust and connection in meaningful ways.

For Pastor Kim, the work became a reminder that faith is often lived out through small but significant acts of presence. Listening carefully, honoring someone's story, and creating space for honest conversation can become powerful expressions of God's love at work in the world.

Projects like this are made possible through Mission Support, which allows the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod to encourage creative ministry, support leaders exploring new ways of sharing the Gospel, and walk alongside people seeking healing, hope, and community. Through ministries like this podcast, we continue to live out our calling to love, heal, and engage like Jesus, trusting that even simple conversations can open doors to deeper understanding and renewed faith. Those interested in exploring the conversations can find the *Condemned Happy* podcast on YouTube, where the episodes remain available to listen and share.
